




west and with an area of just over 1.6 km², Akaoka is Japan's smallest town.



Kinzo the Painter, Ekin,

In his youth, Ekin enjoyed a privileged lifestyle under the patronage of the Tosa aristocracy, until allegations of forgery saw him stripped of his honors and cast into exile.

Ekin drifted until finding succor with an aunt in Akaoka. Here he converted a sake cellar into a studio and pioneered his famed byobu-e. Twenty-three of these masterpieces remain in Akaoka today, and they are in safekeeping here, at the Ekin Museum. Welcome!





Exhibition Hall 1 Ekin's Night

A world that comes alive in the darkness

As a recreation of the night of the annual Ekin Festival, this hall allows visitors to experience the thrill of the event. whatever the time of year.

Each of Ekin's dramatic artworks stands almost six foot tall and, filled with a vibrancy born from a master's hand, they do not simply adorn the room, they inhabit it.

Their blood-soaked scenes writhe in the candlelight as though seeking to escape the confines of the canvas. It is an eerie, yet fascinating world, certain to send shivers down your spine.

Until now, the twenty-three paintings that remained in the town were housed under the care of their respective owners.

With the opening of the museum, however, the decision was made to move them here, where they might benefit from a secure, controlled environment. The rise, fall and rise of Ekin

This hall guides the visitor through the pivotal events of Ekin's dramatic life. On display are some of Ekin's original sketchings and objects used by the painter himself.

Visitors should take a moment to reflect on Ekin's black-on-white ink drawings and how they stand in marked contrast to his vivid, polychromatic screens. Visitors can also learn about his color wash technique, and examine the objects that remain from his painting
